
Since our July issue of the Visionary, there have been, a number of, changes to the IGDF Board and our standing Committees. I would like to bring you all up to date on these changes.

The Board has agreed to establish a new dedicated Standards Committee (SC). This new committee will be led by Tim Stafford. The new Standards Committee will take on the responsibility for reviewing, revising, and writing the IGDF Standards. This will allow the AC to focus on the assessment process as we resume assessment visits. On-site assessments will resume in 2023 and all organisations due to be assessed during 2023 have now been contacted.

The Board of the IGDF and Assistance Dogs International have agreed to update our MOU between us and work more actively together for the advancement of us both. Both organizations do exceptional work and are world leaders in their respective fields. A good example of a current project would be the current cooperation on Dog Welfare. A joint presentation was made at our latest IGDF webinar and at ADI's recent conference in California. Together we have a great opportunity to globally influence the rights and privileges for all our clients and be acknowledged as the De facto world leaders in our professional fields.

Finally, preparations continue for the 2023 IGDF Conference in Vancouver April 27th to 30th. The Conference Programme Committee, led by Christine Baroni-Pretsch has developed an exciting variety of plenary sessions, workshops and panel discussions. Cultural celebrations at Israel Guide Dog Centre

As I write, here in Israel, we have just begun the series of four consecutive Holy Days (aka The High Holy Days / Holidays) which occur in the fall. First, there is the Jewish New Year or Rosh Hashana which usually coincides with the month of September.

At IGDCB, we invite our board, clients, volunteers and staff to join us in a celebration of the New Year. We wish all health and happiness, success and only good things in the coming year. We eat and drink sweet things for the promise of a sweet year; raise a glass of sweet wine, dip apples in honey, eat honey cake and date cookies.

A week later, we observe the holiest day of the Jewish calendar, Yom Kippur, which is a day of fasting and introspection. We ask for forgiveness from those we may have wronged and forgive others who may have wronged us. We attempt to fulfill any pledges we have made to ourselves or others. Most Israelis do not work on this day, however, we must and do have Puppy Centre and Training Kennel staff on campus to care for the dogs.

A few days after Yom Kippur, we celebrate for 8 days the holiday of Sukkot, also known as the Feast of the Tabernacles.

Many people build a temporary hut, called a sukkah to eat their meals. This 'tabernacle' is decorated with hanging ornaments, pomegranates and paper chains with a roof of palm fronds or bamboo matting. This holiday marks the fragility of life and the wanderings of Moses and the Israelites in the desert for 40 years.

The concluding holy day is Simchat Torah (Joy in the Torah.) This is when we complete the reading of the last portion of the Bible, and begin the process of reading it all over again, at the beginning of the first book of the Bible, Genesis.

In Israel, everything is quite pressured before the holidays or "Hagim" as they are called. People want to finish projects to have time to prepare for shopping, cooking, hosting or staying with family and friends for festive meals or to travel for pleasure trips, etc.

There is a common saying which refers to this period; "After the holy days - Achari ha hagim." This literally means - we'll be able to take care of this when we are back to the routine time of "after the holy days." We enjoy this special and sometimes pressured month and wish all of you a healthy, sweet and successful year ahead.

There are many more celebrations here, so the holiday of Passover will need to wait for next time! In addition, there are significant holidays celebrated by some of our clients who belong to various cultures and faiths here; Muslim, Christian, Druze, Ethiopian Christians and Jews.

Every client who comes to the campus of Leader Dogs for the Blind for training is asked a simple question – How was your experience? Without fail, clients excitedly mention the tasty food and excellent service provided by our kitchen staff. Many add, "I was amazed at the effort they undertook to meet my dietary requirements."

"As far back as 40 years ago, we provided a special menu for our clients who were diabetic," shares Sharon Dougherty, manager of residential and food services. "Today we support a wide variety of diets to meet individual religious or health requirements." Our kitchen team accommodates a large variety of diets including diabetic, Kosher,

Halal, gluten free and lactose free, often providing several in addition to a standard menu in each class.

But our kitchen staff don't stop there, they include fun activities centered around meals. There is fiesta night with mocktails (alcohol free drinks) like margaritas, and Michigancentric products like apple cider and donuts (a Fall treat), barbecue dinners and ice cream drinks made with locally produced orange and ginger sodas.

Because LDB has been serving clients from

Spain for several decades, some of their wonderful cultural traditions have influenced our menus, most notably the importance of including fresh fruit with every meal. We've been lucky that some clients have shared their treasured family recipes with us, allowing us to prepare traditional Spanish cuisine for the entire class to enjoy.

Journey to the Goal! Access to Football Stadiums

Football is a popular sport in Japan. In 2019, before the Coronavirus crisis, the average audience was 20,751 people for each Japanese professional football "J1 League" match.

One day, a guide dog user visited the Saitama Stadium, home of the Urawa Red Diamonds, a popular J1 club with one of the highest average attendances per league home game, to watch a football game. Although the Urawa Red Diamonds' staff accepted the guide dog user, they were not sure if they guided them in the right way. With this experience, the staff thought about improving the service for guide dog users so that more people, including people with disabilities, could support the team and enjoy games at the stadium. That was when they asked JGDA for help. JGDA held a seminar for the Urawa Red Diamonds' staff in 2021 in which the staff learned basic information about guide dogs, users, laws, and a role-play of guiding a JGDA staff as a guide dog user to a seat in the stadium with a PR dog.

This May, the Urawa Red Diamonds provided a spectator experience for guide dog users at the home game match with Kashima Antlers to test and clarify the issues on accepting guide dog users. Five guide dog teams joined and enjoyed the game in the stadium while listening to a radio broadcast on a smartphone app.

Arisa Yamamoto, JGDA Public and Media Communication Department staff, says, "the Urawa Red Diamonds, who conducted this verification event, is a club in the Tokyo metropolitan area.

I believe that the initiative taken by such a leading club will encourage other clubs and organizations, and even other sports. Today is a big step in that direction. There have been cases where stadiums rejected guide dog users. I hope this will be an opportunity for all stadiums to know how to welcome guide dog users and increase the number of places where guide dog users can go out to enjoy."

JGDA will continue kicking the ball with the Urawa Red Diamonds to the goal of having anyone, including guide dog users, enjoy football at their stadium. We believe it will be another step forward to a world where guide dog users can access anywhere they want.

Many of our guide dogs working today can have their ancestry traced back to Labradors from the Queen's own Sandringham line.

No doubt, this shared love of dogs was a simple human connection made whenever a guide dog owner had the opportunity to meet the Queen. Guide dog owners often said that while their dogs gave them a great conversation starter, the Queen was more interested in the person behind the dog and always took the time to ask about them, often while the dog snored at their feet.

Dog Welfare Working Group

Update from **Bob Proesmans**

We all agree that dog welfare is important, but even experts have very different views as to what 'good' welfare is and how we can achieve it. Welfare assessments involve considering diverse elements and can risk making value and opinion-based assumptions.

At the latest IGDF webinar held on the 24th November (now available on the website) and at the occasion of the latest ADI conference in Concord, CA, Tim Stafford (IGDF) and Peter Gorbing (ADI) have co presented on the Five Domains and the importance of dog welfare/ethics: "Assessing Assistance Dogs Welfare – A Framework For The 21st Century".

In parallel, the International Guide Dog Federation's working group on Dog Welfare and Assistance Dogs International have joined forces to produce a joint position statement on the ethical training and care of dogs. The IGDF working group on Dog Welfare have profoundly prepared and discussed the content of this position paper over the last couple of months, the outcome being a well-thought balance between science and experience.

Both the IGDF and ADI are now preparing for the launch of this position paper.
This position will inevitably raise lots of questions, questions that will be examined by the working group and answered by the IGDF in a FAQs sheet.

As breeding dogs is part of our members' activity, an ethical code on breeding imposes itself too.

The IGDF Dog Welfare working group will therefore investigate in this matter intensively in the coming months, collecting information on current practices and give recommendations on how to improve.




